Foods for dogs to avoid

(A guide – please do further research)



Alcohol

Apple core/seeds – contains cyanide (in large amounts)

Apricot – seeds, leaves and stems toxic and contain cyanide

Avocado – very dangerous to birds, rabbits, donkeys and horses, sheep and goats

Bacon and fatty meat – can cause pancreatitis

Caffeine and coffee

Citrus fruits – very small doses okay

Cherry – pit contains cyanide

Chocolate – dark is worst

Coconut and coconut oil – small amounts are okay. Coconut water high in potassium

Grapes and raisins – can cause kidney failure

Macadamia nuts – signs can take 12–48 hours to appear and include weakness, vomiting, tremors and hyperthermia

Meat and bones (raw and undercooked) – Salmonella and *E.coli* poisoning like in humans. Bones can cause impaction.

Milk and dairy – causes diarrhoea and stomach upsets

Nuts – almonds, pecans and walnuts – high in fat and bad for pancreas

Onions, garlic and chives – gastrointestinal irritation and can lead to red blood cell damage (worse for cats)

Potato (raw and green)

Rhubarb – depletes calcium levels

Salty and snack foods – large amounts of salt can produce excessive thirst and urinations and sodium ion poisoning

Tomato plants (stems and leaves and unripened fruit) – upset tummy

Xylitol (sweetener often used in cakes and sweets) – can lead to liver failure

Yeast dough – causes gas to accumulate in digestive system – can cause bloat

Plants Dangerous to Pets

Some of our most beautiful and useful plants are deadly to our pets, so it pays to be aware of the risks and keep your pets well away from them.



Brunfelsia (also known as "Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow")

- Extremely poisonous after flowering
- Very dangerous for puppies
- Recommended plant moved away from anywhere dogs have access to



Liliums

- Especially toxic to cats
- All parts of the flowers are poisonous
- Also include cut flowers



Wandering jew

- · Weed that grows well in shade and hard to kill
- Dogs love lying on it to be cool
- Causes allergic skin reaction in dogs



Madagascar jasmine

• Eating the seed pods of these plants can kill dogs



Oleander

- All parts of plants poisonous to several animals
- Affects heart



Bulbs from daffodils, tulips etc

- Tulips upset stomach and possible heart problems
- Daffodils upset stomach, convulsions, heart problems.
- Too many bulbs can cause death



Moses in the Cradle

- Causes skin issues causing dog to scratch until bleeding
- Poisonous if eaten in large quantities

- o Poinciana (not the tropical tree, but the shrub Caesalpinia pulcherrima)

- Pyracantha (not clear which one)
- Rhododendron (including azaleas)
- Rhubarb (presumably the leaves)
- Snowdrops (Leucojum)
- Snowflakes (Leucojum)
- Strelitzia (not clear which one)
- Sweet peas
- Solandra maxima (chalice vine)
- Stephanotis (Madagascar jasmine) (consumption of the seed pods is especially deadly to dogs)
